National Housing Conference Report

Submitted by Councillor Scott Wilson

Recently I had the opportunity to attend the CMHC National Housing Conference in Ottawa. To say it was eye opening, hopeful, and inspiring would be an understatement. I feel I am returning home with a toolbox full of ideas, proven methodology, and gumption to tackle Jasper's acute and unique housing crisis. Across the country municipalities are challenged with a similar crisis, 3.5 million homes are needed by 2030. We already know that over 200 are the responsibility of the community of Jasper, a number compared to the 3.5 million that is digestible, manageable and achievable if we collaborate with our communities' stakeholders and all levels of government. I would have hoped that the Department that administers Jaspers Land Use, Planning and Development would have been compelled to attend such a useful collaboration, a conference in which the sole purpose is to make meaningful progress in solving Canada's Housing Crisis, but there was no representation from Parks Canada.

The Federal Government was represented by the Minister of Housing and Infrastructure and his message was clear, we need to take rapid and urgent action on housing. Parks Canada as a Federal agency must heed that call, they must take this obligation seriously and take swift and appropriate action as the controlling government body over Land Use, Planning and Development in the Municipality of Jasper.

We are no different to the rest of the country in the fact that what we need is Safe, Stable and Appropriate housing for all.

Legalizing density is the single most important thing we can do in Canada to deliver housing in a climate smart way.

We must end exclusionary zoning; Low Density is Bad Policy.

BC has brought in legislation that zones every residential as multi family. Allowing the opportunity for the private market to innovate and design buildings that meet highest and best use.

Across the country, the mantra is INFILL, this is the low hanging fruit, the most cost effective, the most climate friendly, the easiest on municipal infrastructure. Lucky for us this is our only option. We have the benefit of always knowing we aren't building outwards so we must build inwards. We know the playing field. We must enable homeowners, businesses, builders, developers, and government to get to work and solve our own problem.

What we need to do now is:

Contact the Minister of Housing and Infrastructure Sean Fraser. Call on him to collaborate with the Minister of Environment to empower the Superintendent to take action on housing. The Superintendent has the power to rezone. I challenge Mr. Fehr to act on this responsibility, or contact his superiors.

Strike a working group with Parks Canada with one main goal, Legalizing density. This cannot wait until the next Community Plan. Parks Canada and the Federal Government have the ability to rapidly up zone the entire Municipality of Jasper. This is happening across the country at an impressive rate. Parks Canada sits on the majority of the currently multi-family zoned lots in town yet they have no immediate intention to develop them. Empower the private market by

blanket rezoning. Multi-Family Low rise is the most needed and most achievable. This type of development already falls within current LUP regulations if up zoning occurs. The Superintendent has the ability to make these changes and I am calling on his office to take that action.

Building is inherently very risky. We need to minimize that risk for the private market as well as Municipally led housing projects. We must remove barriers on developers: offsite levies, subdivision and up zoning costs should be reduced or removed to entice potential development.

Expedite lane way housing, if Parks does not have the capacity to deliver on this in the near future, we need to request that the Municipality be able to take the reins. This is a fairly simple and achievable solution that is occurring across the country. We need to push this forward. We have the ability to offer incentives to property owners to develop laneway, carriage homes and garage suites. There are so many properties out there, that are under-utilized, double lots with two people living on them. I feel municipal incentives may assist them in their decision to do their part in addressing the housing need in our community at the same time allowing them to remain in their family home.

Remove parking minimums, we are a 15-minute city, we have public transit, to enforce the antiquated view that vehicles take precedent over housing has to end immediately.

We must build policy that streamlines development, for example: Once approved always approved, this enables builders to have more assurance, shorten timelines and reduce overall risk.

We cannot wait until the next community plan to have this conversation. There must be action on housing now, but we also must work towards a new Community Plan with urgency that gives our town the opportunity to densify and flourish within our prescribed boundaries.

In Conclusion, the National Housing Conference was well worth attending and has fortified my view that we are not doing enough to offer our community solutions to the housing crisis. We need to continue to lobby for more control over land, use and planning in the future, but we also must put pressure on the current administration that offers this service. Parks Canada Development Office is currently responsible for not just administering development services but also developing new policy to address the crisis. Through collaboration I truly believe we can make meaningful progress, but the conversation needs to be louder.

April 5, 2024 Mayor Richard Ireland and Council Specialized Municipality of Jasper By Email Mayor Ireland and Council, RE: Transit Fleet and Facility Proposal

The JPCC and the majority of its members recognize the value of transit service and the benefits it can deliver to our community. The current transit model offers cost certainty to residents and relatively low risk during the introductory phases of the service while more comprehensive data is being collected. We realize that a grant for this project is currently available, however, you are now proposing a multi-decade financial and operational commitment with a vague and incomplete business plan. The potential costs associated with the operations and infrastructure of this project could very quickly dwarf the grant money and leave our community with an additional, ongoing tax burden.

On behalf of the Jasper Park Chamber of Commerce and its membership, I am writing to inquire further into the status of the above-noted. As you know, the Chamber and its membership have previously questioned policy, operational expenditures, and long-term planning.

We welcome the upcoming Jasper Transit Open House and hope to have following questions and concerns addressed:

 The rationale for immediately spending a large sum of taxpayer money on unproven E-buses, and the facility to house them, with limited ridership data, vague financial forecasts, and a lack of an ongoing operational budget or forecast, including additional staffing requirements for the transit facility and specialized maintenance requirements for both the buses and the facility. The buses will immediately become depreciating assets and the yearly amounts being proposed to set aside for replacement units is inadequate, based on current and projected EV vehicle costs. The current proposal will leave the MOJ in a major deficit, even if the E-buses last the maximum potential service lifespan of 20 years.

- Recent and extensive data shows that E-buses have serious performance issues, particularly in cold-weather environments. How will potential maintenance and replacement issues be dealt with in a small, secluded community like Jasper?
- The MOJ has no experience operating a transit service and plans to outsource the daily operation of the service. Is there an expected budget for this?
- The parameters of the grant are extremely vague and contain no financial data. How exactly will the funds be spent, what proportion will be levied to the business community, and when will businesses be apprised of the projected financials attached to this project?
- Council has requested Administration present statistics on ridership, excluding student services, proposed additional sources of project funding and finally, a comprehensive financial document that supports the project. We anticipate the MoJ will share that information in a timely manner.

As always, the Jasper Park Chamber of Commerce is a committed partner in delivering services and collaborating on projects to sustain and grow our community and business sector. JPCC has received the Facility Grant RFP documents and will share them with the membership for consideration.

We request a response to these concerns at your earliest convenience. At your request, we would be happy to send a delegation to meet in person to discuss these concerns for the clarity of all concerned.

Dear Mayor Ireland:

Thank you for your letter regarding housing income thresholds for Jasper. As Minister of Seniors, Community and Social Services, I appreciate the opportunity to respond.

I understand your concern about the variance in housing income thresholds between Jasper and Banff and recognize the challenges with affordable housing in Jasper. Alberta's government is committed to ensuring Albertans in all communities have access to safe, secure and stable housing.

The department uses a standardized approach to set income thresholds for communities across Alberta. The annual Apartment Vacancy and Rental Cost Survey (AVS) is used to determine average market rental rates in communities that have populations under 10,000 and contain 30 or more applicable housing units. Rural income thresholds are developed by dividing the province into four geographic regions: North, Central, South Central and South.

Historically, rural communities with outlying rental rates (including Banff, Jasper, Hinton, High Level, Hinton and Blackfalds) were separated from the four geographic regions and income thresholds were developed for each community based on their rental market data. Over the last few years, the department found that the rental rates in outlying communities were comparable to other communities in their geographic region, with the exception of Banff. As a result, a separate income threshold was produced for this community.

As referenced in your letter, the AVS Report completed in 2023 identified that both Banff and Jasper had exceptionally high rental rates for their respective regions. In response to this finding, the 2024 housing income thresholds will consider individual income thresholds for Jasper and Banff based on 2023 market rental data and should address the discrepancy between the two communities. The 2024 income thresholds are scheduled to be released before the end of April 2024.


